COMPANY MEETING

BEECHAM GROUP

Expansion Policy

The eighteenth ordinary general meeting of the Beecham Group, Ltd., was held in London on July 26.

Sir J. Stanley Holmes, M.P., the Chairman and Managing Director, said that the trading profit for the year ended 31st March, 1946, earned by the companies of the Group operating in almost all parts of the world, amounted to £2,784,729 compared with £2,491,581 in the previous year.

Last year he had stated that the Group, which consisted of over 100 companies and branches, had its plans laid for a rapid expansion of export business all over the world in the immediate post-war years. The increase in the profit on the export trade showed that that plan was already in operation and that they were making their contribution to the national export drive throughout the world, and particularly in the British Commonwealth, they were strengthening their organisation and developing their trade. They believed that the result of their deliberations and decisions would considerably increase their overseas and export trade.

Last year it had been reported that they had recently entered the food market. They had acquired the equity of C. and E. Morton, Ltd. During the past year the shares of further food companies had been acquired at a total cost, including Morton's, of approximately £1,000,000. They had registered a new company with a capital of £1,000,000, styled "Beecham Food Products, Limited" to which the shares of all the food companies had been transferred. They were satisfied that the organisation of that new enterprise was proceeding on right lines and would be progressively successful. Their research department was proving its value more and more every day.

CORPORATION HOLD "SAVE FUEL" QUIZ

To The Editor.
 Sir,—I am writing to you at the request of Councillor A. J. Luckett, who is the Chairman of the Corporation Transport Committee, with a request that possible in your paper to an important meeting of all chief officials of the Derby Corporation which was held at my office yesterday afternoon.

The purpose of the meeting was to examine the present position so far as the Corporation is concerned, with regard to supplies of fuel and power, and to suggest means whereby any waste whatsoever might be prevented. One constructive suggestion was that each department should appoint a responsible person designated as a "Fuel-watcher," whose responsibility it would be to see that all stops were taken to prevent waste of fuel and power in all directions.

The Deputy Electrical Engineer, Mr. William Warren, is, of course, the Corporation's Fuel Adviser, and Councillor Luckett incidentally congratulated the chief officials of the Corporation on the great efforts they had made to prevent waste in the past, and urged them to maintain their efforts, and if possible, to increase them. He also pointed out the serious position with regard to the present supplies of solid fuel to the Corporation as a whole.

It is thought that if sufficient publicity can be given to this important meeting, very large concerns in the town might be urged to emulate the efforts being made by the Town Council through its chief officials.—Yours, etc., C. ASHTON, Town Clerk.

Accident In 1914 Caused Death

A verdict of "Death by misadventure" was recorded by the Assistant Deputy District Coroner (Mr. B. Johnson) at the Belper inquest yesterday into the death of Alfred Ball (61), of 186, Kilburn-road, Belper, who died nearly 32 years after fracturing his spine while working at Denby Colliery.

Evidence was given that since the accident in December, 1914, Ball had been bedridden, and Dr. T. G. Whitcroft attributed death to exhaustion and toxæmia due to bed sores following a fractured spine.
